Special Session 1: Health over material possessions, says Prof. Umesh Arya at pre-inaugural reflexology workshop



Special Session 2: Prof. Jaishri Jethwaney decodes New Labour Codes for Working Journalists at ICAN4

Day 2 of the International Conference ICAN4 began with a special session on the subject "What the New Labour Codes have for the working journalists in India: An empirical perspective" with Prof. (Dr) Jaishri Jethwaney, Senior ICSSR Research Fellow, ISID, New Delhi as an expert. The session began with opening remarks of Dr Ambrish Saxena, Dean, DME Media School. He welcomed the guest and said, "Today's media students will be tomorrow's journalists."

In her address, Prof. Jethwaney highlighted the concept of New Labour Codes which now include journalists from the electronic and the digital media, as opposed to print media alone. She mentioned that labour comprises almost 70% of India's total population. "Labour is a concurrent subject and at times it's complex and contradictory," she said.

The senior media academician further shed light on the laws and statutes that have governed the field of journalism in India including the Working Journalists Act. Prof. Jethwaney discussed the drawbacks for journalists caused by a change in the employment status from permanent to contract basis. She suggested that the profession of media should be treated differently and not clubbed together with authors and other writers like NSSO has done. "If media professionals are not considered employees, how will they get social security?" she questioned.

She quoted John Elliot, "All meaning comes to an interpretation" to sum up her views that the impact of New Labour Codes on journalists will be determined as per their construal by the authorities.

This was followed by an interactive Q&A round. Prof. Dr Susmita Bala, Head DME Media School thanked Prof. Jethwaney for her insights on the subject and concluded the session.







Special Session 3: PR influences all communication functions, says Kathryn Lancioni at book unveiling

Master Classes @ ICAN4

Master Class 1: Documentary Filmmaking

The first master class of ICAN4 conducted on July 2 discussed the subject of Documentary Filmmaking with Mr Vijay S. Jodha, writer, filmmaker, and a self-taught photographer based in Gurgaon, as the expert.



Mr Jodha talked about the need for any film to tell a different story or the same story differently. To elucidate his point, he played various short films on different issues and discussed their treatment. He said, "It's essential to understand and appreciate that there are all kinds of films that are made serving all kinds of purposes. Even a film made for an NGO has a particular audience and resource allocation that results in serving the purpose of making it".

Mr Jodha further talked about making one's projects reach the masses. "We are competing with a lot of films. In such a scenario, it's very crucial to make not just a cinematic but an engaging product," he recommended.

Prof. Ambrish Saxena, Convener of ICAN4, initiated the discussion by emphasising on the importance of non-fiction films, while Prof. Susmita Bala, Chief Associate Convener of ICAN4, made the concluding remarks.

Master Class 2: Fact-checking

In the times of an overreaching infodemic, Mr Pankaj Jain, founder and owner of SMHoaxSlayer, Delhi, steered the second master class of ICAN4 highlighting the importance of debunking fake news and fact-checking on July 3.

He was welcomed by Dr Ambrish Saxena, Professor and Dean, DME Media School who defined fake news and briefed the audience about its consequences. "Fake news is a big problem and as media aspirants students should be trained to identify and deal with it," he added.

Mr Pankaj Jain elaborated on the types of fake news, saying, "Fake News is a vague term that has come up recently. Two parts of fake news are misinformation and disinformation." He also shed light on how one could discourage its spread.

This was followed by an insightful demonstration on fact-checking by Mr Jain where he showed the use of

Reverse Google Image and other methods of identifying fake news through headlines.

The final segment of the master class was a question-andanswer session moderated by Mr Mohit Kishore Vatsa,

Assistant Professor, DME Media School and a vote of thanks given by Dr Susmita Bala, Professor and Head, DME Media School, "We indeed have to be cautious. Trust and faith are important but as media persons, we need to cross-check every information," she concluded.



Master Class 3: Artificial Intelligence in Journalism

The third master class of ICAN4 on July 3 focussed on the use and relevance of artificial intelligence in journalism with Dr Uma Shankar Pandey, Associate Professor and Head, Surendranath College for Women, Calcutta University and IAMCR Ambassador India leading the session.

Dr Pandey emphasized on the role of artificial intelligence and the natural language of processing. He addressed the speculations of such technologies taking over future jobs in journalism and said, "There have been talks about artificial intelligence being a threat to jobs but looking at its benefits, it can be seen that based on a minimum amount of input, artificial intelligence can do wonders by creating poems from a single word, enabling us to draw automatically and find adequate images."

Adding to the same thoughts, Dr Ambrish Saxena, Professor and Dean, DME Media School recalled the time when people were reluctant to use computers. "People were scared that there would be no jobs after the introduction of computers but the story is different now. So, it is important to have deliberations on futuristic technologies," he added.

The session also had an insightful Q&A round where Dr Pandey answered several questions put forth by the curious participants. Dr Susmita Bala, Professor and Head, DME Media School, proposed the vote of thanks.



Master Class 4: Rumours and Public Perceptions of COVID-19 Vaccine - Role of Media


ICAN4 witnessed its fourth master class with Mr Nimish Kapoor, Senior Scientist and Science Communicator, Vigyan Prasar, Department of Science and Technology, Government of India, who talked about the crucial role of media in shaping public perception about COVID-19 vaccines on July 4.

Citing examples from across the world, Mr Kapoor explained the issues of miscommunication surrounding the vaccines against coronavirus and particularly in the Indian context.

He shed light on several contemporary jargons such as headline laundering, zombie content and use of uncertainty tactics by the media. The role of visuals in news and data deficits were also discussed.

"Science is nothing but systematic knowledge. When you're communicating it to the masses, always try to think that you're explaining to a young student and try to explain like a story in simple words," suggested the senior scientist. He also insisted that as a journalist, it is vital to understand scientific facts before communicating any information to the audience.

After his insightful talk, Mr Mohit Kishore Vatsa, Assistant Professor, DME Media School moderated the Q&A round between the expert and the audience. Concluding the session, Dr Susmita Bala, Head, DME Media School thanked Mr Kapoor and remarked that more awareness regarding vaccines should be created by the media.



Master Class 5: Practices of Archiving Visual Media: A Case Study from Northeast India

On July 5, an esteemed panel of experts comprising of Dr Ankuran Dutta Associate Professor and Head, Department of Communication and Journalism, Gauhati University, Dr Aparna Sharma, Associate Professor, World Arts and Cultures/ Dance, University of California Los Angeles, USA and Mr Raja Das, Programme Officer, Dr Anamika Ray Memorial Trust, Guwahati conducted Master Class 5 on the topic 'Practices of Archiving Visual Media: A Case Study from Northeast India'.

Dr Ambrish Saxena, Professor and Dean, DME Media School in his opening remarks said that the work being done by researchers for the preservation of Indian arts, culture and heritage is commendable. "There is a need to give impetus to such researches," he added.


Dr Sharma talked about the modern and endangered archive programme run by the University of California Los Angeles (UCLA). "UCLA programme is to preserve archival material mainly of the non-western world especially of the 20th century," she said. "When you work with a photographer from the 1970s you also work through a history of photographs and technicality," she added further.

Citing a survey, Mr Raja talked about the inventory of the photographic collection. He talked about the steps of how to create an inventory and also discussed the issues of copyright, "It is important to know about the laws so that you can use archived photographs for your work without getting trapped into legal implications."

Dr Dutta emphasised on the subject- 'Visual Histories of North-East at The Crossroads'. He said, "In terms of archiving, we have to be very careful in ensuring the validity or accuracy of the content. We need to understand the context of the photographs and make sure there's no misrepresentation of the

larger context."

Dr Tinam Borah, Assistant Professor. DME Media School moderated the queries raised by the participants while Dr Susmita Bala, Head and Professor. DME Media School concluded the session with appreciation for the guests.



Master Class 6: Executing Blended Learning in Media and Communication

Meanwhile, the platform is not available in India. Therefore, the musicians there have

Panel Discussions @ ICAN4

Panel Discussion 1: Social repercussions of online learning analysed by panel moderated by Dr Jatin Srivastava

The first panel discussion of ICAN4 conducted on July 2 was focused on the topic 'People on Zoom: Social Repercussions of Online Learning'. The session was moderated by Dr Jatin Srivastava, Associate Professor Ohio University, and Director, Institute for International Journalism E.W. Scripps School of Journalism, Ohio University, USA.

The panel comprising Dr Anand Pradhan, Professor, Indian Institute of Mass Communication, New Delhi, Mr Zakaria Tonko Musah, Lecturer/Legal Practitioner, Ghana Institute of Journalism, Ghana and Dr Sharon Wilson, Assistant Professor, University Tunku Abdul Rahman, Malaysia, discussed challenges of online teaching, with each panellist describing his/her own experience with the same. The discussion also revolved around how the mentor and mentee relationship has changed.

Dr Ambrish Saxena, Professor and Dean, DME Media School initiated the session by saying, "This is a topic, everyone present here can identify with.



We in India have been facing multiple challenges in online teaching. But we have learnt to adjust and adopted the latest technological innovations to facilitate and make our teaching better."

Appreciating the efforts put in by students in online learning, Dr Srivastava said, "It is good to see students working so hard." Talking about the new world he added "In this new world, there is no other way to form relationships as the usual way is gone. These new relationships are being formed through media platforms and these platforms are new to us."

Dr Pradhan added his take on the discussion remarking, "It was a life changing experience when the pandemic hit. Somehow we have managed through digital tools. The students find it difficult to communicate in the online mode. We are still unable to understand, or plan something innovative which is completely digital and online and suitable to this mode of teaching".

Adding to the conversation Dr Wilson said, "E- learning has become the password. Our roles have changed to the point that it's not just academic; I find myself being a technician as well as a counsellor. But whatever the case, I need to guide my students. I have learnt as much as they have."

Mr Zakaria pointed out the role of online education. "We have to come up with the policy that would recognise online learning. We must start thinking of providing students with transparent skills to become champions of the change."

Following the discussion and a brief Q and A moderated by Ms Manmeet Kaur, Dr Susmita Bala, Head, DME Media School concluded saying that she agreed to most of the panellists' views that these are difficult times, and we have to make most of whatever is available to us.

Dr Vikrant summed up the discussion by quoting Bollywood as the panacea of stardom. The devotion of an Indian fan to Bollywood is unparalleled. For an Indian fan, a superstar is like a God and sometimes even above the Gods and Goddesses," he said. "The Indian fandom and celebrity culture is a subject understudied," he added.

Dr Jatin Srivastava opened the discussion by exploring the salient features of media teaching in the past and future and the relevance of technology. "Media is a multidisciplinary field. People join media education from different streams. It is a crossroad of diverse cultures." he said.

Dr Deb Aikat stated that one doesn't need a degree to be a journalist. "Gandhi Ji never went to a journalism school. Yet he was one of the greatest communicators in the world," he said. "The field of media is transforming with PR and Research being more favourable with the students". Dr Aikat opined.

Dr Sundeep Muppidi, stated that media has a primary responsibility to harness the potential of every individual. "Media education should aim at promoting creative, conscious and critical thinking among the students," he said.

Dr Uma Shankar Pandey maintained that the thrust has always been on treating media education as a training program. "The New Education Policy will dismantle the boundaries between curricular and extra-curricular, between profession and vocation. We still have not harnessed the potential of digital technology." He commented.

Dr Sunetra Sen Narayan spoke about the relevance of vernacular journalism. "The line dividing media education and mass communication education is thin but we do differentiate between journalism and media education," Dr Narayan pointed out.

Dr Jatin summed up the discussion by saying that convergence is the future. "Technology is relevant but the need of the hour is in understanding the role and responsibility of the use of technology. Idea plays a critical role." He said.

The discussion concluded with Dr Susmita Bala, Head, DME Media School pointing out that there is a need for developing an integrated technology which can gel with media education.

Panel Discussion 4: Dr Vikrant Kishore leads discussion on Indian Cinema in Australia

The fourth panel discussion of ICAN4 was held on the theme 'Production, Reception and Distribution of Indian Cinema in Australia' on July 8, led by Dr Vikrant Kishore, Senior Lecturer in Screen and Design, Deakin University, Melbourne, Australia, as moderator of the session.

The panel included Ms Achala Datar, Head, Film Distribution Operations, Zee Studios, Australia, Mr Anupam Sharma, film maker, Australia, Ms Julie Marlow, Producer, Script Editor/Writer, Australia, Mr Kartik Mohandas and Mr Pritesh Raniga, Film distributors, Forum Films, Australia.

Dr Vikrant Kishore started the discussion by paying homage to thespian Dilip Kumar. "Indian cinema in Australia is at the threshold," said Dr Kishore. He invited the panel to explain the nuances of the various facets of the business of Indian cinema in Australia.

Ms Achala Datar began by saying that Indian cinema has grown leaps and bounds in Australia. "As the Indian population is growing in Australia, so is their demand for Indian films. Hindi films are more popular at the box office but it is the regional cinema especially Punjabi and Tamil that are ruling the roost." She commented.

Ms Datar also highlighted the fact that there is a growing demand from the distributors



for Hindi and regional cinema in smaller cities and towns of Australia.

Mr Kartik Mohandas was of the view that those who finance the films control the narratives. He spoke about the power of soft diplomacy and the role and relevance of content and narratives in the process. "It is a golden era of production. The problem is we have too much content. The real content which catches the imagination of the audience is rare," he pointed out.

Mr Anupam Sharma expressed that Indian films are seen as "item numbers" on international platforms. The Australian market is highly deregulated. "The hallmark is that Indo-Australian origin film-makers are concentrating on making films on Indian themes. Very soon we may see 'Kuch Kuch Hota hai' types of films being produced from Melbourne," he said.

Mr Pritesh Raniga spoke about his journey in film distribution from Fiji to Australia. "Earlier we focused on the Punjabi language and Punjabi culture Hindi films. Baahubali proved to be a turning point for the distribution of Indian cinema in Australia", he said. "Market has changed with Covid. Content is supreme. Distributors, now, look for the right content for the right people," he maintained.

Ms Julie Marlow spoke at length from the perspective of Indo-Australian collaboration in cinema. "There is a need for synergy between Indian and Australian filmmakers. It is a long process and needs patience. We need to wait," she said. Pointing out the growing popularity of OTT platforms, particularly Netflix and Amazon Prime, Julia Marlow said that OTT has raised the bar to explore new areas and subjects in cinema.

Dr Kishore and all the panellists emphasized that Indian cinema is growing day by day and there is a necessity to try some innovative ideas and stories.

Concluding the session Dr Susmita Bala, Head, DME Media School said that there is no dearth of good content in Indian cinema. It needs to be explored by the international audience.

Panel Discussion 5: Dr Gauri Chakraborty leads discussion on dynamics of storytelling and content creation

In his address, Prof. Prakash said, "AI is playing a crucial role in our lives, but bandwidth is still an issue. Journalism and Social Media are pushing limits to educate people. It has all the power to reach the unreached."

Moderating the session, Prof. Kiran Bala talked about various facets of AI. She said, "Human communication has travelled a long journey from writing letters to doing everything digitally sitting at home. Artificial intelligence is evolving in various sectors like engineering. New channels are using various algorithms in the media industry. From face recognition to LinkedIn suggestions, Amazon recommendations, AI is playing a massive role in media."

Talking about the use and impact of AI in Media Studies Dr KulveenTrehan said, "Various media are being used in education with technological advancement. Machines that are following algorithms are deeply affecting the lives of researchers and scholars. The role of Artificial intelligence gives constant support in the teaching sector. For instance-Smart Classes."

Dr Navneet Anand in his address talked about AI in PR. He said, "Social media came and we all in the PR sector embraced it. PR industry adopted the changes happening around. AI has a limited role in PR. But yes, it plays a role in media tracking which is very much required in PR. Artificial Intelligence helps in tracking down various pages and clients. PR has evolved in 3 decades. There are only specific areas AI can take up and it can't sway away PR."

Dr Maithili Ganjoo focused on the advertising aspect of AI and informed, "Advertising industry is a very robust and growing industry. Only 45% of digital space is there in advertising. And that 55% cannot be tapped. The current generation is paving a way for Artificial intelligence in advertising."

The session ended with a vote of thanks by Dr Susmita Bala, Head, DME Media School. She appreciated the efforts of all the panellists in bringing out the unfolded aspects of AI.

Panel Discussion 7: Global Practitioners discuss diverse Public Relations practices

The seventh and final panel discussion of the conference held on July 9 revolved around the topic 'International PR Practices'. It was moderated by Ms Kathryn Lencioni, Author and Eminent PR Professional, New Jersey, USA.

The panel consisted of experts from multiple countries of the PR industry including Ms Florence Jouve, Communication Consultant, France, Ms Christine Perkett, Communication Consultant, USA, Ms Alejandra Leglisse, Senior PR Professional, Maxico, Ms Ramya Chandrasekaran, PR Expert, Singapore, Ms Paola Chiasserni, Senior Business Manager and Head of Food and Nutrition Area of Omnicom PR Group, Italy and Dr Pooja Arora, Senior PR Professional, Noida.

Commencing the session, Dr Ambrish Saxena, Professor and Dean, DME Media School emphasised the reciprocated adaptation by every country due to the global pandemic in the field of Public Relations. "Amidst the pandemic, today's panel can play a crucial role in highlighting the global outlook of the PR industry and provide a unique perspective," he said.

Ms Lencioni initiated the discussion by introducing the importance of the panel to reconcile the similarities and dissimilarities between PR practices of different countries. "In the era of going global, PR remains an industry where glocalization is a relevant term keeping in phase the dealing with cultural diversity," said Ms Lencioni.



Ms Jouve began by saying that International PR is conveying messages and information to different parts of the world, targeting culturally diverse audiences. She said, "As PR practitioners we face numerous challenges including cultural barriers in customizing the information passed along." Talking about breaking a story to the press, she said that it is essential to host events and interviews rather than mere dependence on press releases.

Highlighting the importance of press releases, Ms Perkett elaborated on the use of press releases as a list of facts that can be referred by the audience as well as the brand in the time of crisis. She also mentioned the advent of multiple platforms and the derivation of brands on these platforms. "Every business needs to know about their audience before jumping to a social media platform. It's not just a strategy but a tool," she said.

Ms Leglisse threw light on the skillset required for a career in the PR industry. She described the role of PR as a medium that pitches stories as well as all that a brand deals in. "In my experience, you must have a basic knowledge of journalism to offer press releases, testimonials and different angles of a story to pitch," she said.

Ms Chiasserni expressed her concern for the reformed PR industry during the pandemic. "Due to the digital shift, we could not meet journalists and feed them stories, naturally. This relationship with media is evident but due to the confines it becomes challenging," she said.

Ms Chandrasekaran provided insights into the importance of digital skills in the PR industry. She said, "It is essential to have digital skills and adequate knowledge of SEO, marketing trends, and analytical skills to survive in the industry."

Ms Arora explained the evolving nature of the industry and described the changing nature of the pitching process among PR practitioners. "Earlier mass emailing was prominent but the current scenario demands focused pitching. Earlier having platform-specific campaigns worked but now there is a need for an integrated approach of digital and social media strategy," she said.

Following a brief Q and A moderated by Ms Mudita Raj, Assistant Professor, DME Media School, the session was concluded with a vote of thanks by Dr Susmita Bala, Head, DME Media School.





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
